An overview of Forest Gardening

What is Galk-galk dhelkunya?

Galk-galk dhelkunya meaning to care and heal to trees and forests in Dja Dja Wurrung language is Djaara's contemporary philosophy and practice for managing Djandak's cultural landscapes.

“Forest gardening is about getting Djaara back into landscapes. It heals us and it heals Country, and we lead the healing on our terms”

BACKGROUND

Djaara biocultural knowledge, customs and practices are what informed our Martinga Guli (Dja Dja Wurrung Ancestors) management and caring of Djandak for thousands of years.

Forest Gardening is Djaara's approach to healing the harm done to Country from colonisation and wrong land management practises.

Forest Gardening is developed from Djaara traditional knowledge and stories and is practiced in a contemporary context in response to threats such as land clearing, climate change, biodiversity loss and species extinctions.

The Forest Gardening Strategy 2022-2034 aligns with the timeline of the Dhelkunya Dja Country Plan and outlines a vision for healing Djaara's cultural landscapes.

Vision for Forest Gardening

Galk-galk Dhelkunya is Djaara's holistic cultural landscape management philosophy and practice. In implementing the Strategy, our vision is:

Djandak's landscapes are healing through Forest Gardening, allowing for greater focus on interaction with Country in all its elements.

People living on Djandak are inspired to walk with Djaara to heal Country together, guided by Djaara custodial knowledge and Galk-galk Dhelkunya principles.

Djaara are empowered to practice and share culture with pride

Forest Gardening Implementation

Implementation of the Strategy will be led by DJAARA members and Djaara biocultural knowledge. Over the next 3-5 years, a range of demonstration sites will trial Forest Gardening tools and activities across Djandak. This will build capacity, capability and provide evidence for longer implementation until 2034.

Trial tools on parts of Country with different levels of health	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Health determined through Djaara/Indigenous science, utilising both cultural and environmental indicators.
Trial tools across different land tenure arrangements	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> In Djaara Parks under joint management On crown land managed by governments On Djaara owned land On private land through private sector partnerships, with NGOs (e.g. Trust for Nature) and/or private landholders
Trial tools on parts of Country with different levels of health	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Health determined through both cultural indicators and environmental indicators through Djaara/Indigenous science
Trial tools in response to different threats	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> For example, threats from climate change (floods, storms, fires, droughts), up-side down Country from mining and land clearing
Apply combinations of tools, activities and interventions at the same site	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Listen to Country – and where needed multiple interventions may be needed. For example, a site might start with cultural thinning to provide space for larger trees to develop, followed by cultural burning, then revegetation of any missing species, and then cultural water flows.

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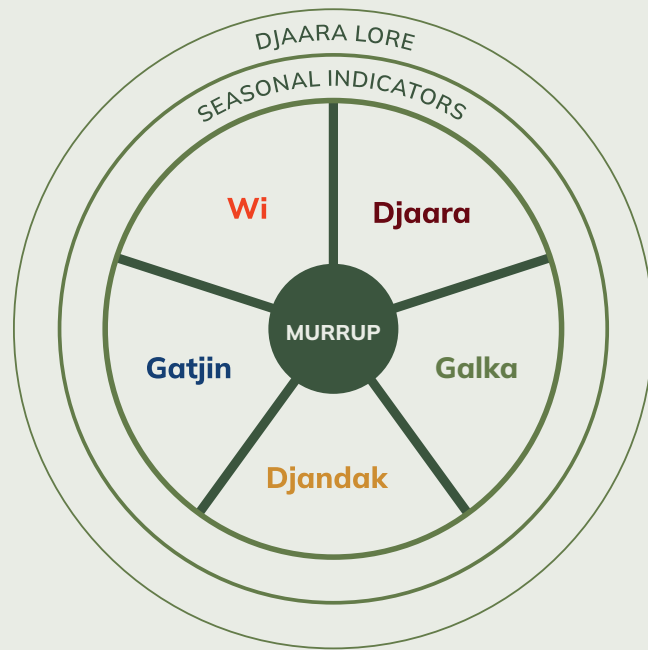

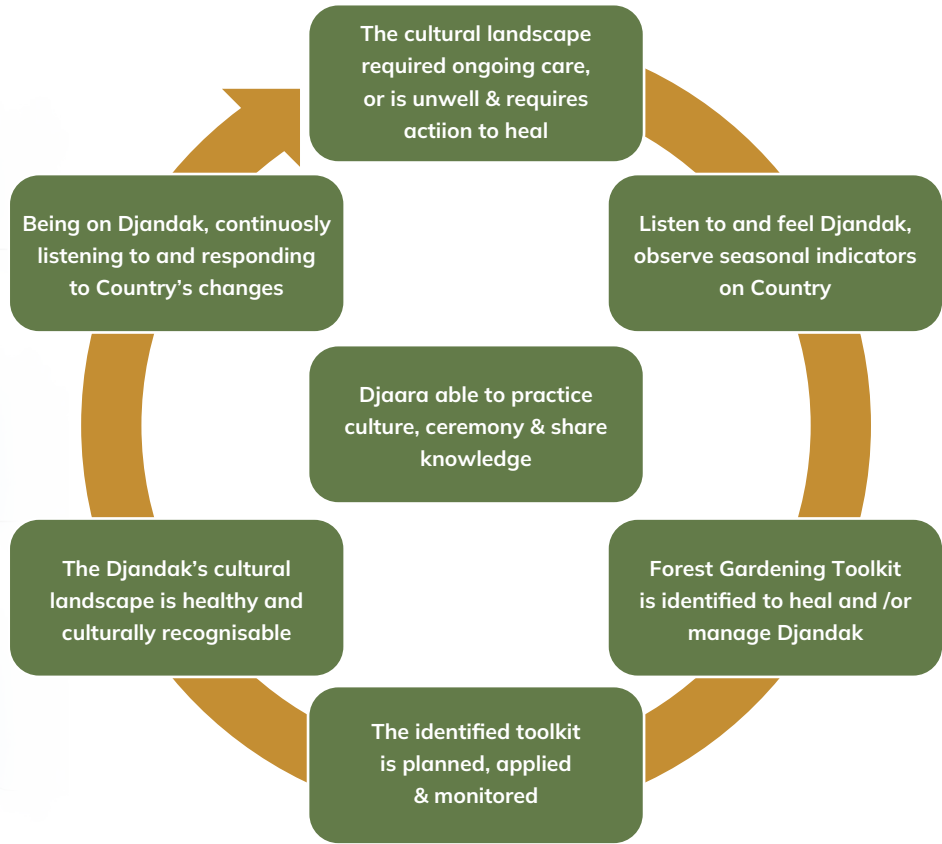
